SUMMARY OF ITINERARY

The Rev. Dr. Gordon Gibson will lead the tour, provide videos enroute, readings and commentary to enrich your experience of visits to museums and sites significant to the Civil Rights Movement, and encounters with people who were part of the struggle. Gordon was an early participant in the Selma voting rights campaign (1965) and was the Unitarian Universalist minister in Mississippi 1969-1984. He led similar tours in 2004 and 2005.

- ◆ Birmingham, AL – The 16th Street Baptist Church, the Civil Rights Institute, and Kelly Ingram Park, meet local veterans.
- ◆ Marion, AL – Home of Jimmie Lee Jackson. See memorials, gravesite, meet veterans of the Movement.
- ◆ Selma, AL – Visit Brown Chapel Church, Voting Rights Museum, tour with Movement veteran, walk Pettus Bridge.
- ◆ Selma to Montgomery March – follow the route, visit Viola Liuzzo memorial.
- ◆ Montgomery, AL – See where march ended, M.L. King's church, civil rights memorial, Rosa Parks Museum.
- ◆ Hayneville, AL – Jail and store where Jonathan Daniels was killed, memorial.
- ◆ Philadelphia, MS – Churches, COFO office, memorials to Chaney, Schwerner and Goodman.
- ◆ Jackson, MS – Tougaloo College, local sites, meet and talk with Movement veterans.
- ◆ Mississippi Delta – Greenwood (COFO site), Money (Emmett Till), Ruleville (Fannie Lou Hamer).
- ◆ Oxford, MS – campus integrated by James Meredith. Meet Movement veterans, now on faculty.
- ◆ Memphis, TN – National Civil Rights Museum, site of M.L. King's assassination.

INFORMATION

The trip will begin early Saturday morning, March 18, boarding the bus in Chicago to travel south. It will end on Sunday evening, March 26, when the bus completes the trip from Memphis to Chicago.

The cost of the trip is \$1000 per person, which includes transportation on a luxury tour bus, eight nights in double rooms, all fees and most meals. Two dinners will be on your own. To have a room to yourself, add \$300 in room costs (total \$1,300).

Meadville Lombard Theological School is offering credit to theological students registering for this tour. Call the Academic Office at Meadville Lombard, 773-256-3000, x228 or indicate on the registration form if you need more information on requirements.

A non-refundable deposit of \$250 per person with the registration form will hold your space. The balance will be due by January 18, 2006. Following that date, refunds may not be possible.

Up to 30 people may register on a first-come basis. If you register after the 30 spaces have been filled, you will be waitlisted. If no space opens up, you will receive a full refund.

Rooms pre-reserved are all non-smoking. Let us know if you prefer a smoking room.

Meal reservations will be made with vegetarian options requested. Please indicate on the registration form if this is your preference. However, vegetarians take note: most meals will include vegetable choices cooked "southern style," with ham, bacon, etc. If you have any specific dietary limitations, you may need to provide some of your own food.

Transportation and accommodations to/from Chicago, IL are your responsibility.
